Aircards Aircards are self-sealing greetings cards, the price including postage to anywhere in the world, including inland. They were originally trialled on a limited basis from 16 September 1997, and the six new designs and packaging reflect the customer feedback received through the reply paid response card which was inserted into all cards. Five aircards, designed to appeal to a wide and diverse audience were launched on 1 September 1998. A Christmas aircard will be launched on 6 October, featuring 'Angel in prayer' by Irene von Treskow.

The aircard has been designed to stimulate growth in the short term message market by facilitating the writing process and making it more attractive. It is intended to fill the gap between a letter and a greetings card. Cards have become a popular way of communicating with friends and family. Despite the ease of use and affordability of the telephone and





other methods of keeping in touch, sending a message in the mail retains a special and personal edge. Research in 1996 revealed that letter writing is a widespread habit for a large proportion of the population, and with the extent to which people travel, more and more people are building a network of contacts abroad with whom they communicate. Written messages in the mail are the preferred medium for expressing emotions and are more satisfying for both he recipient and the sender, reflecting the importance of the relationship. Royal Mail has focused on the promotion of the short message market in its advertising for over two years and continues to run high profile campaigns.

The new aircards (price $\pounds_{1.30}$ each) are initially being sold in 51 postshops around the country and will gradually appear in other offices as demand dictates. Availability through other outlets is being investigated •
