Britons of Distinction Ten individuals who have shaped our world in important ways are celebrated in an intriguing special issue

High-achieving Britons with a variety of artistic and scientific gifts are remembered in next month's special issue of ten stamps entitled Britons of Distinction. Some of the names on the stamps are world-famous, some lesser known, but all of them were exceptionally successful in their particular field of endeavour:

Basil Spence: architect of Coventry Cathedral (shown on the first stamp), which opened in 1962 and was built in a controversially modern style to put new heart into Coventry following the destruction of the city's 14th-century Gothic cathedral during a ten-hour bombing raid in 1940.

Frederick Delius: composer whose most famous pieces – such as 'On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring' – evoke a English pastoral idyll. He was born in Yorkshire to German parents and lived for decades in France.

Mary 'May' Morris: gifted textile artist (daughter of William Morris), represented on the stamp by a piece of her embroidery – The Orange Tree.

Odette Hallowes: a French-born British secret agent in wartime France, who survived solitary confinement in German concentration camps.

Thomas Newcomen: lay preacher, ironmonger and inventor of the atmospheric steam engine (shown on the stamp). His first working engine was installed at a coal mine near Dudley Castle in Staffordshire in 1712.

Kathleen Ferrier: the Lancashire-born contralto who achieved an international reputation as a stage, concert and recording artist.

Augustus Pugin: architect, designer and advocate of the Gothic style, represented by an image of the interior of the Palace of Westminster. Montague Rhodes James: medieval scholar and provost of King's College Cambridge, known as the originator of the 'antiquarian ghost story' genre. Alan Turing: mathematician and computer scientist. The stamp shows Turing's Bombe code-breaking machine at Bletchley Park.

Joan Mary Fry: relief worker, social reformer, ardent pacifist and Quaker, who worked as a prison chaplain in World War I, organised post-war famine-relief in Germany before returning to England
