The chosen subject of the last Millennium issue is 'Hopes for the Future', embodied in the next generation – the world's children. The issue is inspired by the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, with each of the images connected to a different right of children.

The Future is the last set in the series of 25 issues of Millennium stamps which started with The Inventors' Tale, back in January 1999. The 1999 issues concentrated on past

achievements, ideas and events whereas the issues during 2000 have taken as their inspiration Millennium projects across the UK. The entire series consists of 100 stamps in all; the Royal Mail Millennium Collection was granted the status of a Millennium Product by the Design Council in December of last year.





For the design of the stamps, a broad base of creative talent was invited to submit ideas in response to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. The short-list included photographers, illustrators, fashion designers, artists and graphic designers. Some 16 responded with initial visual ideas and more than 100 amazingly diverse images were presented to the Stamp Advisory Committee.

The sac narrowed the field down to five images – all by graphic designers – which were further developed. One of the most direct solutions was by London-based design practice Why Not Associates: a close-up of a child's face with text overlaid that suggested children's rights. The simplicity of the idea swayed the Committee and Why Not Associates were asked to develop an entire set of photographic close-ups of children. Each of the faces was to be painted to render a disguise, as living people other than Royalty should not be featured on stamps, as well as to inject fun into the set. Each painted creature or object has a subliminal connection to a different right of the child.

The childrens' faces are painted as a flower on the 2nd class (19p), a tiger on the 1st class (27p), an owl on the 45p, and as a butterfly on the 65p. The two top rates cover the basic and 1st weight step rates for international airmail letters. The children who feature on the stamps are four and five years old; the photographs were taken at several sessions at a London studio by Welsh photographer Sandro Sodano in August 2000. Care was taken to match the features, complexions and eye colours to the painted subject. The stamps are captioned 'Millennium/2001' followed by letters spelling HOPE (over the four values) and 'Nature children' (2nd), 'Listen to children' (1st), 'Teach children' (45p) and 'Ensure children's freedom' (65p). The captions and The Queen's silhouette are printed in silver ink.
